“BARN OWLS IN KENTUCKY- CURRENT MONITORING AND MANAGEMENT”

Kate Slankard will be presenting our November program on Barn Owls of Kentucky. She is an Avian Biologist with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources who specializes in raptors and songbirds, directing projects on bald eagles, barn owls, osprey, grassland songbirds and forest songbirds.

Barn Owls are a rare species in Kentucky and KDFWR has put much effort into increasing their numbers. Kate’s presentation will provide a glimpse into the secretive lifestyle of this species. In addition, she will provide details on what has been learned about the species in our state, as well as the successes and failures of the recovery program.

Project Feederwatch



NOW'S THE TIME TO JOIN PROJECT FEEDERWATCH

Project what? you say. Project Feederwatch is a citizen science program through Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology. For a small (\$18) fee you can participate in a national program collecting data about the birds you see in your own yard (or in a park or nature center). You choose two consecutive days you want to watch, then observe and identify the species you see in your designated area. The program starts the week of November 12th, but you can start as late as Dec. or Jan. The commitment is to observe and enter your data regularly throughout the winter months. Although the program runs until April 7, 2017, no one will fault you if you miss a week or two...just pick it up when you return from your exotic birding vacation J.

Why take the time? This is your opportunity to add to the data that analyzes trends in bird distribution and abundance, the timing and extent of winter irruptions, as well as the changes in the winter ranges of feeder birds. In addition, you can monitor for special circumstances, such as eye disease found in finches. Need more information? Go to www.feederwatch.org to learn more and sign up.

RUDY MINES TRAILS: AN UPDATE

Our field trip to Rudy Mines on Oct. 15th tested our resolve...the day began with pea soup fog! Eight of us set out and the sun began to warm us and burn off the fog. Steve Hahus “tested” Laverne and Doreen about the trees and wildflowers as we hiked. We wound up with about 19 bird species, including both Golden and Ruby-crowned Kinglets. More importantly, it inspired us to follow up on Sara McNulty and Gary Emord-Netzley’s presentation at our October meeting. We are in the process of writing a grant for collaborative funds from National Audubon to help make the area more bird-friendly. The goal will be to build a Bluebird Trail and add directional signage. In addition, we’ll add a species checklist and a display of the Kentucky Field Guide to the Overstreet Road kiosk. The application is due Nov. 30th, so we will know by Dec. 15th whether or not DCAS will be awarded a grant.

Species list for Rudy Mines on 10/15/16: Killdeer, Tufted Titmouse, Northern Flicker, Carolina Wren, Robin, Blue Grosbeak, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Common Grackle, Northern Cardinal, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Eastern Towhee, Indigo Bunting, White-throated Sparrow, Tennessee Warbler, Blue Jay, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Starling, Canada Goose.

All of these stories, I cannot tell. Hmph. Drat. Darn.

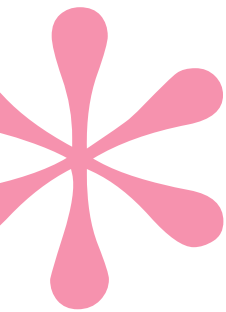
